

10 Steps to Purchasing the Right Body-Worn Camera

Choosing a body-worn camera is more than comparing prices. The right system should match your operational requirements, recording environment, evidence workflow, budget, and support needs.

1. Define How the Camera Will Be Used

Start with the mission. Determine whether the camera will be used by law enforcement officers, private security personnel, investigators, field personnel, or other authorized users. Consider where it will be worn, typical shift length, lighting conditions, weather exposure, and whether recording will occur indoors, outdoors, in vehicles, or across multiple environments.

2. Identify the Features You Actually Need

Create a practical feature list before comparing models. Consider video resolution, low-light or night recording, field of view, pre-event recording, one-button operation, GPS, Wi-Fi or cellular connectivity, display screen, audio recording, encryption, storage capacity, and other functions required for your operation. Focus on features that solve real operational needs rather than paying for capabilities you may never use.

3. Determine Battery and Shift Requirements

Battery performance can directly affect field reliability. Estimate the length of a normal shift and how frequently the camera will record. Ask about expected operating time, standby time, charging options, replacement or rechargeable batteries, docking stations, vehicle charging, and the time required to recharge the unit.

4. Evaluate Storage and Evidence Management

Decide how recorded video will be transferred, stored, reviewed, retained, and protected. Depending on your organization, you may need local storage, secure downloading, docking stations, evidence management software, cloud-based storage, user permissions, audit trails, or retention policies. The camera is only one part of a complete evidence workflow.

5. Confirm Durability and Mounting Options

A professional body-worn camera must perform in real-world conditions. Review the camera's construction, environmental ratings, operating temperatures, and available mounting options. Consider uniforms, tactical vests, jackets, shirts, belts, helmets, or other equipment on which the camera may be mounted. A secure, practical mounting system is essential for capturing usable video.

6. Consider Ease of Use in the Field

Complicated equipment can become a liability during critical situations. Evaluate button placement, recording indicators, screen visibility, menu navigation, file transfer, and how easily the camera can be operated while wearing gloves or working under stress. The best camera is one personnel can operate quickly, consistently, and correctly.

7. Compare the Total Cost — Not Just the Camera Price

The purchase price is only one part of the investment. Consider accessories, mounts, chargers, docking stations, replacement components, software, storage, warranties, training, and long-term support. Comparing the complete system cost provides a more accurate picture of what the equipment will cost throughout its useful life.

8. Ask Questions Before You Buy
